How does the battle begin?

The year is 1066 and William sets sail from France with his great army. The Normans are heading for England! At last they land in the south of England at Pevensey in Sussex. William and his men now travel to the town of Hastings where the battle will take place.

Harold is the king of England. He hurries from the north with his small army of about 7000 men, many of whom are peasants. They do not have better weapons than the French and do not know how to fight in a war.

On the 14th of October 1066 the battle begins!

Why does King Harold lose?

It has been a long march and Harold's men are After a very long march Harold and his men are tired. The Normans, however, have rested and are ready to fight. Legend has it that King Harold is killed when he is shot through the eye by an arrow. With their king now dead, the English flee for their lives and William wins the battle! Today we still call him 'William the Conqueror'.

On Christmas day, William is crowned the new king of England and a new chapter in England's history starts.

Why do we still remember this battle?

It is strange that a Frenchman becomes the king of England.

King William has a tapestry made in Bayeux, France to celebrate his victory. It takes almost three years to make and is 51cm high and 70m long. It shows us the story of 1066: how William and his men sailed to England, what food they ate, what clothes they wore and what weapons they used - it even shows us how Harold died!

If you want to see this piece of history for yourself and do not want to go to France where it hangs today, just put the words 'Bayeux Tapestry' into a search engine and you can look at it on your computer screen instead
